The faculty cast a total of 219 votes. Of these, 141 were in favor of the quarter system and 78 voted for the semester. Breaking down the votes for the quarter system; 56 favored the quarter, 26 liked the system as we now have it, and 59 wished to have a reorganized quarter system.

The two polls showed that the quarter system is desired on this campus by both the students and faculty; but some revision in the system as we have it now is desired. Most of the people who were polled expressed the opinion that the quarter system is the best if the courses were arranged differently.

Aggie Vet School Rated Tops in U.S. States AVMA Head

Colorado A & M's veterinary division is now rated as the top veterinarian school in the United States due to the new half-million dollar hospital which has been added to the facilities of the veterinary division of the college, according to Dr. C. P. Zepp, Sr., New York practicioner and national president of the American Veterinary Medical association.

"I've traveled throughout the United States and at present Colorado A & M rates at the top with this building, Zepp said. He is one of the 200 veterinarians who attended the annual short course on the Aggie campus this week.


A dinner dance at Ladd's Covered Wagon Monday evening was the top social event of the conference which continued through Wednesday.
